PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

This first year of my service to the Stern Center as President, the consistency of responses I hear when I share the news of my new professional role has been striking. What I have heard, again and again, is:

I'm not sure whether you know this, but the Stern Center really turned things around for [our child/our grandchild/a young person we care about]. I can't even express to you how much of a difference the Stern Center made. The impact was life-changing.

What an honor to hear firsthand these stories, testimonials to the power of learning to change the course of individual lives, to nurture families, and to enrich communities with a diversity of great minds. For 38 years since our founding by President Emerita Dr. Blanche Podhajski, the Stern Center has been steadily changing the world with one success story after another. In recognition of that legacy of impact, this Annual Report is dedicated to Blanche, with our respect, appreciation, and affection always.

Our Annual Report reflects the belief that Learning for All is essential—not a luxury or an option, but a right. Around the globe, the right to learn, and the hope offered by access to a meaningful education, is still contested, a source of struggle as well as a beacon of hope.

Closer to home, issues of access to learning are compelling and increasingly urgent. Our Vermont fourth graders' proficiency in reading, according to national benchmarks, is 37%, down six percentage points from the prior measure. Disparities of race and socioeconomic status worsen the gaps. Reading fluency correlates positively with increased educational attainment, income potential, career opportunity, and health outcomes. Now more than ever, literacy for all learners is inextricable from a meaningful commitment to equity.

Author and educator David Grant, virtual keynote speaker at last October's Annual Meeting of the Stern Center, notably describes organizations like this one as producing "social profit, " distinct from the business sector's primary focus on financial profit. While we earn

sustaining revenue from the expert services and educational programs that we provide to students, families, educators, and schools, we also raise funds from all of you who share our dedication to lowering the cost of those services and programs and



to advancing our impact. In fiscal year 2021, we gave away \$256,739 in financial help to those we serve. I am grateful for the generosity that makes Stern Center scholarships possible, and for the visionary focus of the Cynthia K. Hoehl Institute for Excellence on supporting deserving teachers in knowledge-building to succeed with every class, every year.

As the map on page 9 shows, we've reached teachers from 38 states and four countries this year. Our Academic Instruction program and our Social Learning and Communication program each increased services to students by 20%. As you explore the data and stories in these pages, I invite you to hear the voices of our learners and their family members, of teachers, of leaders for learning, and of generous donors, all motivating us to continue to generate social profit by fulfilling the promise of Learning for All.

A world in which everyone is empowered to learn is a world worth working tirelessly to achieve. May these stories point the way to a future in which every learner has the access, the support, the teachers, and the inspiration to bring forth their unique gifts in a world that awaits them.





professional life to providing students opportunities to develop skills in, and hopefully increased enjoyment of, reading and writing.

Last week, one of my students here at the Stern Center made an error reading a word. His reaction to his error was laughter. Instead of getting frustrated, hanging his head, or mumbling negative sentiments about himself or the activity, he laughed. The mistake didn't injure him; it entertained him. He had learned that making mistakes was okay and that he was learning how to fix them. He self-corrected his error and read the word accurately on his second try.

The most significant outcome that I see with my students is when they reach a point when they can independently navigate the problemsolving process. They realize that they are capable, which is incredibly empowering.

COMMUNICATION IS ONE OF THE CENTRAL CAPACITIES OF

HUMANS, and helping a person develop that capacity feels energizing and life-changing. It is enormously rewarding to see people changing their life circumstances and trajectory because of their improved ability to communicate, self-regulate, understand other people's perspectives, and engage with the world.

One very memorable moment for me was when a young adult client who had been completely nonverbal learned to use an Augmentative Alternative Communication device to speak words, and then phrases after working with the Stern Center. It is an enormous confidence-booster for the students, many of whom have lived with years or decades of being

told (directly and indirectly) that they do not belong. They develop the ability to recognize the value of their own thoughts, feelings, and intentions, as well as how to receive that information from others.



A systems-change approach grounded in the science of reading, Lead to Read has been steadily growing as participating school and district partners make a renewed commitment to students' vital success in reading. Below, three of our experts reflect on their work with Lead to Read.



Vice President of Advanced Learning, Janna Osman, M.Ed.

The work of changing the trajectory on literacy is truly urgent. For me, as the point of contact that many school leaders talk with first about their goals, it's the Stern Center's commitment to a genuine partnership and strong collaboration that has made the program resonate. This is not a onesize-fits-all model. We really listen. We want to understand both the literacy data and the culture of each school, and then align those with Lead to Read's comprehensive approach. We're educators, and our Lead to Read model provides support for teachers, specialists, school leaders and others to do this hard work. We are inviting schools, districts, and supervisory unions into the work of change, and it is making a difference!

One thing we know for sure about changing literacy outcomes is that leaders and teachers need to join together to make this work. Both play a critical role in partnership with each other to improve literacy outcomes for all students. Through our work, my hope is that every teacher is able to help every learner become a thriving reader.

Lead to Read Structured Literacy Coach, Andrea McLaughlin, M.Ed., C.A.G.S.

As someone who has provided professional development in literacy for many years, consulted with districts about how to change literacy outcomes, and served as an assistant superintendent, I always dreamed about working with a team of educators committed to supporting schools in changing literacy outcomes. I so value the Stern Center's emphasis on responding to where schools are in the moment and helping them to move forward to use what we know from

A critical part of Lead to Read is the coaching provided to teachers. Being able to talk with others about the course content—to really unpack what it means for teachers' instructional practices and examine student assessment data—is often key to making changes and more effectively reaching students. The advantages of working with a coach are reflected in the research: We know that teachers want to know why they are learning something new, they want their past experiences to be honored and respected even if challenged, they want their learning to be relevant to their work, and they want to be presented with opportunities to problem solve the situations they encounter.

Prior to the Lead to Read Program, I felt isolated with my desire to implement structured literacy, and now I am able to work as a coach with whole teams of teachers who want to learn more about the science of reading.

Over the past five years, or more, I have significantly shaken up my thoughts about education and teaching literacy. It all began when I took an in-depth look at my students' data and an overwhelming feeling hit me – I was doing something wrong. That's when I discovered the science of reading and pursued several courses to gain the skills needed to apply my newfound knowledge in small group reading intervention lessons. As this knowledge base blossomed, I began applying structured literacy and explicit instruction into focused lesson plans. After a short period of time, I observed my students becoming more confident with their reading and spelling skills, and they shared with me the successes they were having in the classroom.

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Orton-Gillingham (OG) is a flexible approach to literacy instruction that systematically teaches the structure of the English language. OG is the underlying foundation of all multisensory, structured literacy programs to promote deep teacher knowledge to improve students' reading, spelling, and writing. The Stern Center's OG Institute has been accredited with the OG Academy since it was was founded in 2010.






